9. Monitoring	How would you know if the CJS initiative is successful?

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- Is there a high level of satisfaction among the stakeholders and groups affected by the initiative?
- Are the goals of improved effectiveness and efficiency being achieved?
- Is there a need to revise
- the initiative's goals? What are the adjustments that need to be made to the plan?
